

ep, it was official on June 1st. Ten years of short-term mission service. It was that millennial year before Sept. 11, 2001, that event that changed the way we do so many things, not the least of which was the sending of international missioners to Russia, Mexico and Africa. Airline travel has never been the same since.

Yet, in spite of those and so many other difficulties we've overcome in a decade, we rejoice to report that since our founding June 1, 2000 and with the return this week of the 12 member Northern New Mexico Mission Team and the July 10th Flagstaff Rescue Mission Team of 21, we have sent out 2047 short term missioners to 111 destinations, donating over \$1,037,034 in free labor, materials and medicines. We now have 29 sponsoring churches from 15 denominations or independent theological persuasions. We operate from generously donated office and storage space in Flagstaff. God has



blessed us with an operating annual budget of \$129,565 and additionally having on hand now \$41,833, ready to disburse in designated funds to specified mission causes.

We extend heartfelt thanks to each of you who through the years has prayed, given or gone on mission to make all this possible.

So, come and help us celebrate our birthday at this year's Annual Celebration Banquet, Friday October 1, 2010 at Trinity Heights United Methodist Church, Flagstaff at 6pm. This year's special banquet celebration is FREE, though we ask that you RSVP for reasons of food preparation and set up. We're expecting upwards of 320 so let us know early if you can come and how many are coming with you! Great food, wonderful fellowship, video presentation from our missions



over the 10 years and outstanding musical inspiration are part of the evening. Our guest speaker is Lola Bahe, pastor's wife and former Elderly Ministries Director on the Navajo Reservation at Leupp, Arizona.

OLD TOWN MISSION, APRIL 10TH

SERVING THE WORKING POOR: That is the main goal of the Old Town Mission in Cottonwood, Arizona.

Bryan Detwiler has been serving the working poor with his whole heart and soul in Yavapai County since 1989. To quote from their April 2010 newsletter:

"We are now responding on average to over 3300 requests for service monthly and are working diligently to create additional resources so we can continue to provide services with excellence and proficiency. The task is great, but Old Town Mission is blessed with faithful donors and

volunteers and a bright and gifted staff—whom together, God is using to serve and to impact the community for His glory."

We have been taking volunteers to Old Town Mission for about five years now at least once a year, and this past April we continued with this tradition. On a bright, beautiful Verde Valley morning, 24 folks coming all the way from Williams to Casa Grande gathered at the mission to start work. After donuts, coffee and an inspirational devotion by team leader Noah Green, we all went to our corners and came out serving.

There was furniture moving, floor stripping, shelf building, roof repairing, painting, floor waxing, and that was *just* at the mission. We also sent a team over to the Mission Thrift Shop, which is now a growing, income- earning venture for Old Town Mission. The team there was sorting, folding, and hanging clothes, moving furniture, and working outside in the temporary tents they have set up to hold all the overflow. All this frees up the staff and other volunteers that work at Old Town Mission and Thrift Shop to do the job of helping the needy directly. The *FaithWorks* team worked very hard that day and deserved every sore muscle and bruised shin they got.

A special thanks goes out to the First Presbyterian Church of Casa Grande youth group that came with Henry McLaughlin as their leader. This was their very first mission trip, and they did an awesome job! *FaithWorks* loves to get youth involved in helping others.

SUNSHINE RESCUE MISSION

B uilt in 1957 on S. San Francisco St. in downtown Flagstaff, Arizona, the Sunshine Rescue Mission has *never* had a renovation job like this! On Saturday, July 10, for one of our one-day missions, 21 volunteers gathered at 8am on a bright northern Arizona morning ready, willing and eager to go to work. The SRM is a wonderful haven for homeless men to get a meal, bed, food, and Christian nurturing, but the building has been terribly abused over the years. We came alongside Stephanie Boardman, the Executive Director, to try and spruce the place up a bit. We undertook a major painting job on the outside, a total renovation of the front wall by installing new windows and insulation, major light fixture replacement inside, and a *total* cleaning of the kitchen and restrooms by a very capable crew of ladies from Williams! Along with enjoying the fellowship with the residents and plentiful food (that kept multiplying), the team made enormous progress in upgrading the facility. We are hoping that we/someone can get the rest of the job done in the future, but the *FaithWorks* team really made an impression. Thank you, team!







Glen Allen and David Patton made an investigative and accountability visit to Northern Tanzania on April 12-19 to make the rounds of places where we (FaithWorks) continue to serve with missions. McCURDY MISSION JUNE 27-JULY 2

McCurdy Mission School is a Methodist affiliated Christian School located in the Espanola Valley of Northern New Mexico. It has provided quality education in a Christ-centered environment that maintains Christian values and empowers students to reach their highest potential. McCurdy was founded in 1912, and the graduates often come back to serve the school. Many families have attended McCurdy for generations. It is a safe haven for students in a drug and alcohol infested community.

Faithworks joined three other mission groups serving McCurdy School; altogether, there were 40 volunteers in mission. Our dorm rooms were very comfortable, and the homemade meals were delicious with a variety of food such as wieners in a tortilla! Muy bien!

Vicki Luviano, Assistant Church Relations, gave us our orientation to the school, our mission, work details and time schedules. She explained that in order to save money, they were not employing cook teams, so we all helped cook the meals. Everyone also helped wash dishes, sweep and mop floors, and clean tables. Vicki explained that McCurdy almost closed last year from lack of funding, but they were able to stay open after selling some school properties. She took us on a tour of the facility and pointed out the 400-year-old irrigation system still operating at the school and community, and the oldest building, the gymnasium, built around 1912.

Our work consisted of stripping and waxing high school floors, building a pole barn near the maintenance building, and painting murals on the school walls. Our *Faithworks* Team had devotions twice daily by team members. Sometimes, discussions followed and other mission groups joined us.

Twice during the week we boarded the Campbell Soup Van (bought with Campbell Soup labels that we and

others across the USA send) and headed out for a half-day excursion. Our first trip was to visit Santa Fe to look at the art shops and see the Loretto Chapel and the Miraculous Circular Staircase. Our second excursion was visiting the Espanola Valley. We met a woman woodcarver, saw El Santuario Chapel in Chimayo, then visited Ortega's Weaving Shop and Museum.

On Wednesday night, we attended Vespers at the Old Methodist Church associated with the school. Many of the other missionaries came to the service. There was praise singing and a sermon by the female pastor about the Prodigal Son, followed by some testimonials and a prayer circle.

On Friday, our last day, we cleaned our rooms, getting them ready for the next mission group. Twenty two Arizona churches established a prayer team consisting of over 100 people to pray for this *Faithworks* Mission! We successfully accomplished the work projects we were assigned, and we were pleased with the outcome. We look forward to another week at McCurdy next year June 19-25, 2011. Come and join us!

WHAT'S HAPPENING WITH FAITHWORKS IN MEXICO?

What with all the daily doses of Arizona/Mexico "border-bad-news," many of you have prayed for us and asked about the future of our long-standing ministry in Mexico. The best way I know how to answer is to explain what happened in reaching the decision to cancel the May 13-16 Mexico Medical Mission trip.

Let me share the letter, outlining many of our considerations, that I sent to each member of that team:

Dear Mexico Team,

Already of course, you have received a phone call on Wed. afternoon from either Jan, Dr. Austin or myself relaying the decision to cancel the May 13-16 Mexico Medical Mission this past weekend.

This note is to follow on that, giving you further perspective. I thought you deserved that. After all, you have displayed such trust and faithfulness in our decision-making on this, I felt you would like to know more of the process and factors in this painful decision.

We are so very proud of all 18 of you for being willing to go on this mission right up to the very afternoon before leaving, even in the face of such confusion surrounding the "situation" at the border.

As you remember, I expressed to you clearly in our last email my concerns for the team's safety and the measures I had already taken with much prayer and consideration, to reduce the risks associated with our latest 21st Mexico Medical Mission. i.e.: not crossing the border on Thursday night (as before) but instead waiting until Friday morning; not walking out and around the Motel 6 at night; insisting you carry your USA passport on your person at ALL times, etc.

I felt we were as ready and prepared as we could be in the circumstances. Thanks to you all, we were assured that the packing of 16 wheelchairs to donate; vehicle readiness (two borrowed vans and trailer) medicines purchased; meal arrangements; coffee orders; motel reservations, etc. were all ready to go!

Then, beginning on Wednesday morning at about 7:30am, interesting "caution signs" started to appear for me: my last minute phone call to Mexico to talk to Gela revealing the likelihood of a weekend-crowded-protest/boycott at the Mexico Border crossing back in to the USA; a re-read of the USA State Department "Travel Warnings" (which we subscribe to) to citizens anticipating going to Mexico indicating the increasing "unpredictability" of violence in border towns due to drug cartel route competition; an article in the Arizona Republic on the 2-week old, drug cartel, roadside murder and robbery of an American in Santa Ana (very near Agua Prieta and where we've done a clinic before); and a phone call to a trusted friend in Tucson who stays in constant contact with the "situation" in Agua Prieta and the border. Finally, an incoming call of concern from a team member's family and a consultation with our Board President, Dr. Bill Austin.

I concluded that the safety level for our 18 member American Medical Team was eroding quickly, and the best course of action was to cancel and re-tool for the future.

In short, those and other caution signs as well as the "Holy Hunch" of the Holy Spirit that I've learned to trust through these many years - were all turning into a great big "Stop Light!"

That's when I made the decision @ 2pm on Wednesday, and we made our calls to you ASAP! This is one of only two times in 10 years that we've had to wait until that close to departure time to cancel a trip.


I apologize for the inconvenience it may have caused you. I understand and appreciate all that's involved in a trip of this type.

On Friday, it was our joy to forward to Gela's Douglas, AZ postal address where she picks up her mail, a letter of affirmation and assurance of our continued support and love, and have enclosed, thanks to many of you, a check for \$500 to use for her family and ministry. We were going to present that to her at the joint worship service we always have together on Saturday night.

I'll be making a personal trip to meet with Gela in Agua Prieta to assess the future. Many things are changing in these turbulent political, social and economic conditions. We especially need to pray that people will stop misinterpreting the laws that are set forth to keep us ALL safe and secure.

Please pray for Gela serving as the new pastor. Pray for the other leaders there in Mexico: Celia, Peggy, David, and others who are so important to the on-going success of the clinic, meeting so many health needs in that dirt-poor Colonia. Pray that FaithWorks can continue to be a blessing in Jesus' name and bring glory to God the Father through good medical practice in Mexico.

Adam Graley, who was our US-African Orphan Project Director, and is a veteran of three Africa missions, has asked us if he could fill that position. We have prayed and set it before the Board of Directors who gave their approval to look into the possibility. Adam will need to raise a year's worth of support, which would be about \$2000 a month, before we could send him to Africa.
